New Family Winni Week August 13-19, 2011

This summer, GPC will offer a new program called Family Winni Week. It is actually an old idea now re-introduced as a relaxed, lightly programmed and very flexible week for families. The new program is a trial and has a limited capacity for up to ten families. The basic fee for the week covers all meals, lodging, swimming and boating at the GPC waterfront, evening campfires and other family games and activities. The emphasis is on healthy fun, flexibility, affordability and renewal for the whole family. In addition to the standard activities, there will be optional on-site or off-site activities that may have an additional fee associated with them. Families may choose a three-day option (Saturday-Monday) which for a family of two adults and two children will be less than \$500.00. Or, that same family could stay the whole week (Saturday-Friday) for under \$1,400.

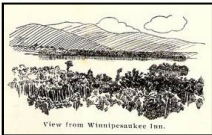

 - Repairs to exterior wall of Kitchen
- Meeting House: Replace projector lamps

 - Electrical system repairs
- Ice Cream Shop: Replace roof
- Shower House: Replace roof
- Replace septic system lift pumps and controls that serve the Pasture Line and Peat/Re-Peat area

A substantial portion of the annual operating budget is dedicated to these projects. However, the extent to which many of these projects can be completed depends on the generosity of the Friends of Winni who make an annual gift or special contribution to help with the care of buildings and grounds. Safety Concerns Lead to Winter Tree Project



Trees are high on the list of GPC's great assets, but they are also something that have to be periodically cared for to assure a safe and healthy environment for all of Geneva Point. Over the years, a great many trees have become diseased, rotted, weakened by harsh weather or become overly mature. Some trees have been allowed to grow to close to buildings and now cause serious harm to their exteriors and foundations. This is a long standing problem for GPC, and in recent years more and more trees or limbs have fallen and caused damage to buildings, cars, roadways, electrical and phone wires and other property.

To address this safety and general property concern, the Property Committee and Staff worked with foresters and developed a plan to selectively remove trees in a few areas around our campus including, and most notably, Dock Road, The Inn and the Staff Housing areas. Work began early in the winter and will be complete before this summer's camps and conferences begin. It will be very obvious to anyone returning to GPC this summer that many trees have been removed. Great care has been taken to minimize the anticipated negative esthetic impact that usually goes with the cutting of trees. Even with that care, we know some people will lament the loss of any tree and be unhappy with this project. We hope everyone will appreciate the extreme importance of eliminating the safety significant risk represented by these particular trees. While it



will take some time to adjust to what these areas look like with some of their trees gone, it is also true that the careful selection of the trees removed actually enhances the appearance and functionality of these areas as well as their safety. In addition to making things safer, the tree project will also benefit GPC by helping cabin roofs last longer and reducing the mold and mildew that can plague buildings that are heavily tree shaded. Site lines across the campus and to the lake are also enhanced and the opportunity for new growth and even selected tree planting is now created .

This project is consistent with an overall forest management plan maintained by GPC .

A Memorial Reflection of Cliff Spotholz - Former GPC Board Member and Devoted Friend

Clifford H. Spotholz, 83, of Jefferson, NH passed away on December 16, 2010. Lois Williston Spotholz, his treasured wife of 53 years, died previously in 2007.

Cliff and Lois initially came to GPC as participants of the Lutheran Winni Week. Cliff loved the beauty of the grounds, the lake, and surrounding mountains. He was especially interested in the variety of wild flowers and trees found on the property. Working along side John Glasser, Cliff assisted with the project of placing signs on or near as many of the varieties of trees and plants as they could locate on the grounds. Fellow Winni Weeker, Herb Wedler, shared his special time with Cliff last summer – “He and I walked the trail along the lake from Lake View Lodge. Cliff remarked at how well the signs have lasted, and had me repair and reposition some that had been moved by ice and snow. We never made it to the beach, as he tired quickly and had to rest many times. However, the smile on his face, and the excitement in his voice, made this last walk together something I will never forget.”

As a GPC Board Member for nine years, Cliff was committed to preserving GPC for the future. His generosity and energy impacted the building of the Meeting House, in addition to other site projects. Former Board Member, Miriam Jensen stated, “Cliff was devoted to GPC and Lutheran Winni Week in every way and understood the importance of family lineage.” His “daughter-niece” Cassi Williston and her family have also been a part of the GPC experience visiting from Illinois over the years.

Employed by General Foods – Kraft, Cliff headed the division for research and development until his retirement in 1983. His projects/products included Maxim’s Instant Coffee, Swansdown cake mix,



A Memorial Reflection of Hazel Hill - Valued GPC Volunteer



Long-time GPC volunteer, Hazel Hill, 82, passed away March 8, 2011. Hazel was a dedicated volunteer at GPC for nearly 20 years. Ron Baker, former Executive Director, attended the Center Harbor Congregational Church in New Jersey with Hazel and recruited her to get involved. “Running the Crossroads gift shop was her love,” Ron shared. She put an emphasis on selling fair trade crafts from SERRV and 10,000 Leaves. In addition at GPC, she spent time helping with laundry and in the ice cream shop.

Hazel was committed to volunteerism. She was a part of a mission and fellowship center in St. Louis, MO and then moved to Philadelphia, PA where she taught Sunday School and sang in the church choir.

She always made friends in her travels.

Her nephew, Ron Hill said “she always did arts and crafts projects with the kids.” He has such fond memories of family times. A special story he shared was from his wedding day. He had done some pre-wedding celebrating the night before and had overslept. It was Aunt Hazel who stopped by his apartment to get him up and going for his big day! He said she was always there for family.

GPC was so fortunate to have Hazel a part of our family for so many years. She will be missed.





A Memorial Tribute to GPC Teacher and Friend, Dotti Siftar

Geneva Point Center said farewell to our dear friend, Dotti Siftar on December 26, 2010.

Dotti practiced as a registered nurse, was department head in Psychiatry at Our Lady of Lourdes Medical Center in Camden, New Jersey, and was Psychiatry Nurse Educator and Clinical Coordinator at Hahnemann University Hospital. She also founded and directed The Children's Community, a Montessori school in Pennsylvania, and taught guitar to hundreds of students of all ages.

Dotti and her late husband, Bob, came to GPC in 1963 as teachers for the Northern New England School of Religion (NNEsRE) Conference. As the years progressed, they continued to teach during other conferences including the Labor Day Conference, the Lutheran Conference, One Parent Family, Camp Carole (a camp for children with cancer), and grandparent-focused programming. In addition, they were a part of several Elder-hostels over the years.

After Bob died in 1994, Dotti wanted to honor her husband at GPC by building a playground for young children and dedicating the former Craft House into the Siftar Cottage. The playground was specifically located next to the Barn so children could safely play while adults danced. A key item Dotti felt important to have on the playground was a grandparent's bench.

Dotti and Bob believed GPC was a place to live in community and form connections with others. This sentiment was passed on to their six children and ten grandchildren who continue to visit GPC regularly. Dotti's daughter, Barb Siftar, continues her parents' legacy by organizing volunteer work weekends at GPC, leading singing, and participating in the NNEsRE Conference annually. When reflecting on giving back to GPC, Barb stated the importance of stewardship through volunteer and philanthropic efforts. Barb shared that, "GPC is my spiritual home. GPC can have amazing impact in just one week of your life."

Dotti's teaching evoked creativity through sessions on storytelling, folk dancing, and singing. She loved to sing and lived by the musical motto, "Hallelujah Anyhow!"

Bill Milford, a member of NNEsRE shared that Dotti "lived by example that the ordinary is transformed to the extraordinary if we can bring passion to it - whether it is a song, dance, game, relationship, or community." GPC Board Member and NNEsRE Member, Tom Weston Jr. reflected "She taught us that with a smile on your face, a story in your mind, a song on your lips and a prayer in your heart, you are ready for whatever the world can throw at you. And her example of simply living her life challenges us all to be better."

Dotti Siftar will truly be missed by the GPC family.

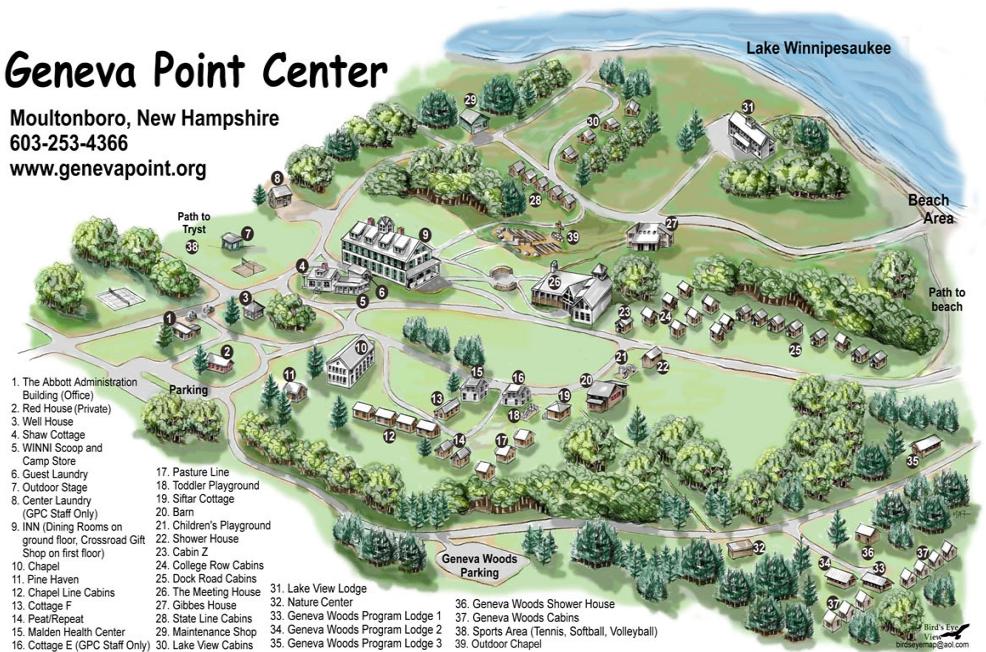
Welcome to Geneva Point Center

Annual Report for 2010

The following is an expanded and updated version of GPC's Annual Report first delivered at the Annual Meeting held on October 2, 2010.

Report of the President

The summer of 2010 was quite a summer for Geneva Point Center. During his second full season, Peter has firmly established himself as GPC's Executive Director. He is a wonderful steward to our property and host to our guests. Thanks to the work of Peter, our staff and dozens of volunteers, GPC's buildings and grounds are looking better, more comfortable and safer. Our guests have also enjoyed improved meals and staff members who are responsive and accommodating.

Such were the comments of guests I spoke with during the 2 and 1/2 weeks my family and I stayed at GPC this summer. During our stay, we completed many volunteer projects including roofing a cabin, painting picnic tables, and quite a bit of pruning of bushes and trees. I also spent many hours talking with guests, group leaders, GPC staff, and our neighbors. Of course, we also had fun swimming, walking the trails, playing Frisbee, singing, dancing, and stargazing.

Peter and I held "Directors Receptions" with three of our key groups, NNESRE, Lutheran Winni Week and CFO. These were 60 - 90 minute get-togethers during which Peter and I discussed the recent past and present of GPC and how we are shaping a vision for the future. **Executive Director's Report**

The year of 2010 gave us much to be hopeful for—there are four areas of interest I can point to as evidence.

First of all, we had a wonderful time with our camps, conferences, and guests in general during the summer and throughout the year. All together we had approximately 4,295 guests visit GPC for at least one day, compared to 3,925 in 2009. However, many of our guests stayed a shorter time in 2010. On August 8th, 2010, GPC hosted approximately 300 guests for the Community Landmarks Tour which included three of our own historic buildings, along with three other buildings on the Moultonborough Neck and Long Island.

A second hopeful sign is the overwhelmingly positive results we received in our guest evaluations for the summer of 2010. We saw improvement in every aspect of our operations over 2009 based on the responses from over 350 guests.

The third hopeful sign is the increase of volunteer support. This year already, more than 100 volunteers have contributed well over 1,000 hours of good service to make our buildings and grounds look, feel, and function better. Three of GPC's long-time conference groups participated in the new Volunteer Bank Program that is designed to increase volunteer support and give back support to those conferences in the form of discounts on their conference fees.

The fourth hopeful sign can be found in many places throughout Geneva Point where work has been done to clean, repair, and improve our buildings and grounds. Most of all to note are the highly visible accomplishments at the Inn including the new roof, new siding and new windows (on the Lakeside Dining Room).

While these are all good reasons for hope, there are still challenges to meet. The realities of the current economic situation have resulted in decreased participation in 2010 for many of GPC's major annual summer conferences and other events as well, which, of course, means less income. Those drops were somewhat offset by a few groups that stayed strong or even grew in number (yet another hopeful sign). However, it is clear that in the final accounting for our fiscal year of 2011 (April 1, 2010-March 31, 2011) we will not see the kind of positive bottom lines we have enjoyed in the previous two fiscal years.

I want to express appreciation to all of the 2010 volunteers and staff who worked so well together to move Geneva Point forward.
